A great day for our College Community last Friday. Bishop Patrick O'Regan, Bishop of Sale blessed the Notre Dame de Sion Learning Centre and the refurbished St. Patrick's building. The Centre was then officially opened by Bishop Pat, Br. Peter Carroll FMS and Hon Darren Chester MP. Also attending was Ms Maria Kirkwood, Director Catholic Education of Sale, Sisters of Our Lady of Sion; Mary Barbuto and Patricia Watson, Mr Danny O'Brien, State Member for Gippsland South, Past Principals; Br. Julian Casey, Br. Terry Orrell and Br. Paul Kane, Marist Brothers and Marist Schools Australia representatives, Catholic Education Office Sale representatives, current and past students and staff along with members from Y2 Architects, MELBCON, and the local community.

This day marked a milestone on a journey that started in 1890 with the arrival of the Sisters of Our Lady of Sion and the Marist Brothers in 1922. We are building on their hard work and the gifts of past generations and planning for the education of future generations.

This particular stage of our journey celebrates:

- The Blessing and Opening of the Notre Dame de Sion Learning Centre;
- The re-development of the St. Patricks building into a modern educational facility and;
- The commissioning of our Reflective Charism and Faith Garden. The focus being the Heritage Walk with original items from the Sisters of Sion and the Marist Brothers.

Our Charisms are highlighted by the characteristics of the Sion and Marist Charism. There are six

Recently I, along with Peter Centra, Cindy Foat and Mark Graff, attended the Marist Schools Australia, biannual conference in Melbourne, the theme being 'Holy Today'. There were many keynote speakers, including Bishop Gregory Homeming, who spoke on Spirituality and Leadership Today. Ms Tracey McEwan whose topic was Women in the Australian Catholic Church, Brother Peter Carroll, Provincial of the Marist Brothers who spoke of the Marist Association of St. Marcellin Champagnat, and, Dr Frank Malloy, National Director of Marist Schools Australia whose topic was Ministry in Marist Schools Australia and Governance. This was a most enlightening conference, enjoyed by all.

All staff from Catholic College Sale joined with staff members from Nagle for a 'Spirituality Day' held in Sale. This day was facilitated by Dr. Carmody Grey, Catholic Theologian.

Topics covered 'Christianity, Humans and Other Living Beings' and, 'Measuring Success'. Staff gathered in groups for further discussion on the challenges and new ideas of these topics before bringing back responses that were raised in their groups.

We welcome back our students and staff from the 2019 Santa Teresa Immersion. Members of this group have stated that the immersion was 'humbling but exciting'. I would like to thank the Principal, Mrs Deb Madgen, students, staff and the community of Santa Teresa for welcoming our pilgrims and making this immersion so meaningful within their lives.

The week the College has also celebrated Founders Day, with the Feast of the Assumption whole school liturgy to acknowledge our College Founders and the Charisms they have shared with us over the past 129 years in Sale. Students then enjoyed a community lunch together and gathered to participate in the senior annual Performing Arts festival. Congratulations to Ann Roffe and the VET Music Group, performers and Houses, also to the Students and Staff of the winning House – Daly.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

Every Day Counts

A new report from the Australian Institute for Teaching and School Leadership (AITSL) reinforces the strong correlation between school attendance and student achievement, and highlights the importance of forming good attendance habits early.

The release of the Attendance Matters Spotlight report is also a reminder of how crucial it is to ensure students feel welcome, safe and supported at school, and encouraged to attend. The evidence summary indicates that the overall school attendance picture in Australia is good, with Years 1-10 students attending, on average, 92% of available school days in Australia – a rate comparable to other countries with high performing education systems. Nevertheless, there remain areas of concern, including the 25% of Australian school students that attend less than 90% of school days, and that school attendance decreases as remoteness increases.

Highlighting that 'every day counts' when it comes to attendance, the report reinforces the negative correlation between absence from school and achievement, which is cumulative and can affect academic outcomes in future years of schooling.

It is critical that we work as a team to ensure that the consistent message our children receive is around the importance of getting to school on time and every day. If you are experiencing some difficulties getting your child to school, please speak or email your child's House Leader and or Learning Advisor as they are best placed to work with you and support your child.

Pathways Evening – Subject Selection 2020

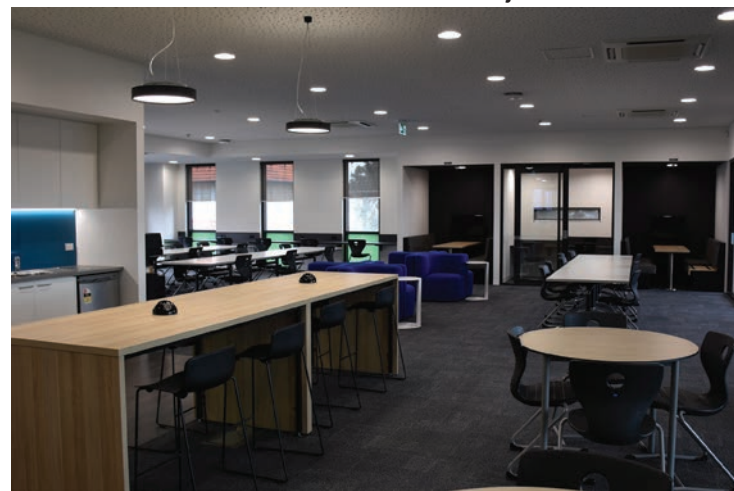

Some of those in attendance were Bishop Patrick O'Regan and Br Peter Carroll, fms, Honourable Darren Chester MP, Maria Kirkwood, Director of Catholic Education in Sale, Danny O'Brien, State Member for Gippsland South, Sister Patricia Watson and Sister Mary Barbuto representing Our Lady of Sion Sisters.

The Blessing was led by Bishop Patrick O'Regan.

Principal Mr Chris Randell said "We continue to build on the hard work and gifts of past generations and planning for the education of future generations."

The completion of the Notre Dame de Sion and Refurbishment of the St. Patrick's building is the first stage of a consolidation of both campuses. The St. Patrick's building was originally constructed in 1922.

Work Experience Werribee Open Range Zoo

This term I was lucky enough to be accepted to do work experience at the Werribee Open Range Zoo. It was an amazing experience and I highly recommend anyone who is interested to apply. You can choose to go to any of the three Zoo's in Zoos Victoria, but it was a really great experience at Werribee Open Range Zoo.

To be nominated, I had to apply and then complete some specific applications a year before I could go. I had to do a cover letter and answer the questions that were sent to me. When my application was accepted the Werribee Zoo sent me emails telling me when I was doing my experience and what I will be doing each day.

I was chosen to work at the open range zoo for five days, from Monday to Friday, working in all the different departments they have at the zoo. The departments included, Learning Experiences, Safari, Horticulture, Life Sciences and Visitor Engagement. Every department was different in their own way, but they were all very good and I loved working in each department with many different people. Below is a little description of



what I did in each department;

- Learning experiences: I was able to be involved and witness activities and learning classes that the zoo does for schools that come and visit the zoo. I got to watch and be involved in a prep class, a Grade 5 to 6 class and even a Year 12 VCE class.
- Safari: I went on two different safari's that they offer at the zoo. I was able to learn lots of facts about the zoo and animals. I also learnt how they do their run their interviews to choose their safari workers. I also got to go behind the scenes with the gorillas and watch animal talks.
- Horticulture: I learnt that the zoo had a large plantation of different types of plants for all their animals. I got to see all the different plants and know which plants where for each animal. I got to help measure new plantations for new plants and also help clean up around the zoo.
- Life Sciences: This day I got to go help feed all different kinds of animals including hippos, camels, ostriches, and more. I got to watch different animal talks and went behind the scenes with many animals including the cheetah. I then got to help clean the enclosures of many animals including koala's and the badicutes. I also helped to see if the badicutes had babies or not and I was lucky enough to discover that one did.
- Visitor Engagement: I again got to watch different animal talks. I got to feed more animals and learn and help with their conservation efforts at the zoo, which included collecting the phones that were donated for the "They're Calling On You."

I learnt so much in each area, especially about the animal conservation that they do and also how we can help these conservations. Some of their animal conservations include "Beads For Wildlife", "They're Calling On You", and "Love Your Locals." There are many ways you can help these conservations, for example giving old or unused phones to Zoos Victoria, buying beaded jewelry made by women from Northern Kenya and even buying recycled toilet paper to help protect our local wildlife. I highly recommend visiting the Zoos Victoria website (<https://www.zoo.org.au/get-involved/act-for-wildlife/wipe-for-wildlife>) to encourage you to find out more information about these conservation efforts .

Overall I had an amazing time working with all the different animals, in the different departments, and with many people that taught me lots of facts and information about jobs with animals, conservation efforts and just how awesome animals are.

The day concluded with a Mass by Bishop Pat. Overall, it was a day that offered R.E.S.A. students the opportunity to meet others, demonstrate their leadership skills and step outside of their comfort zones.

On Monday the 17th of June, we went to Uniting, a non-profit organisation in Sale which helps people of all ages in all situations. We were introduced to what Uniting do and how they help the local community. While we were there, we helped the Uniting staff by packaging hygiene kits containing toiletries such as toothbrushes, shampoo, conditioner, tampons/pads, deodorant, hair combs/brushes and other items, which are then distributed throughout the Wellington Shire to people who are in need, including those experiencing homelessness. We prepared over 100 hygiene kits during the short time we were there, which saved the staff a lot of time and allowed them to work on other things to help the community.

HOW CAN OUR SCHOOL COMMUNITY HELP?

St Mary's Primary School Classroom Helpers - By Mairi Fowler-Bell and Olivia Norris

The R.E.S.A. class has been attending St Mary's Primary School Sale every fortnight to assist some of the classes there. Pairs of Year 11 students have been assigned to specific year levels to assist.

The reason for this service activity is to build positive relationships between the two age groups and pave the way for them to one day attend our school. We make things easier for the teachers and help the kids with anything they may need. The CCS students complete tasks such as: listening to students read; printing and laminating worksheets for the senior levels; setting up for any physical education classes; organising activities and answering student questions as they work.

We attempt to set good examples for the junior students so that they have positive role models.

MARYSVILLE EXCURSION

The Unit 1 Geography classes travelled to Marysville, the town that was hit the hardest by the 2009 Black Saturday fires.

As a group we discovered that the town of Marysville is still coming to grips with the devastation that was caused by the fires in 2009. We learnt about the significant short and long-term impacts of the fire on the environment, the economy, as well as the social make up of the town.

Our guide Barry Thomas a retired international cameraman, showed us through the local museum that had a rather large collection of artefacts that were recovered after the fire. One of these artefacts, a child's plastic cubby house that had been melted by the fire, was evidence of the fire's intense radiant heat. We also heard stories of survival and loss as well as a few lessons on how quickly fires like those on Black Saturday can impact on people.

From there we made our way to the Gallipoli Oval. This was the place of refuge on the night of the fire. The townspeople that survived were mainly gathered on the main oval as their town burnt around them.

Our guide then explained how both the state and local government had responded in the aftermath of the fire to rebuild the community. This was followed by a trip to the town's Black Saturday memorial where we read the names of the people that were lost as well as the gratitude the town had to those who had helped.

The next step was to be guided down the main street, where Barry pointed out the 4 properties that had survived the fire that night. 90% of the town's buildings were lost and as we made our way up the street we noticed the large amount of empty rebuilt shops showing that the economy of Marysville is still struggling to revive.

After lunch it was time to head to Steavenson Falls just out of town. The fire had significantly impacted



the falls and the evidence was still there to be found with many dead Mountain Ash trees still visible on the mountains around the Falls. The class drew field sketches of the area, read information boards and took photos of the falls. Geography students have now compiled a Field Trip Report based on the data they gathered. Overall students had a very interesting day and were able to produce a report that reflected their firsthand knowledge of this site.

Knitting Group

Students have an opportunity to learn the basics through to advanced skills such as lace stitches, cables and how to follow a pattern. LITERATURE EXCURSION

Year 10 Literature Visit to NGV

On Friday 19th July, students in the Year 10 Literature class had the opportunity to receive lectures and tutorials at the National Art Gallery of Victoria in their endeavour to build a greater understanding of their curriculum. The students participated in two lecture-style tutorials, where they needed to identify elements related to Feminist and Psychoanalytical Perspectives. After lunch, they were asked to specifically analyse Picasso's Weeping Woman, among other works, in order to respond creatively.

They had a chance to look around areas of the National Art Gallery and interact with the artworks. This was a fantastic opportunity for these students to build their understanding of perspectives in Literature and ways of developing and presenting a Creative Response, which are skills that they try to develop over the course of the year.
