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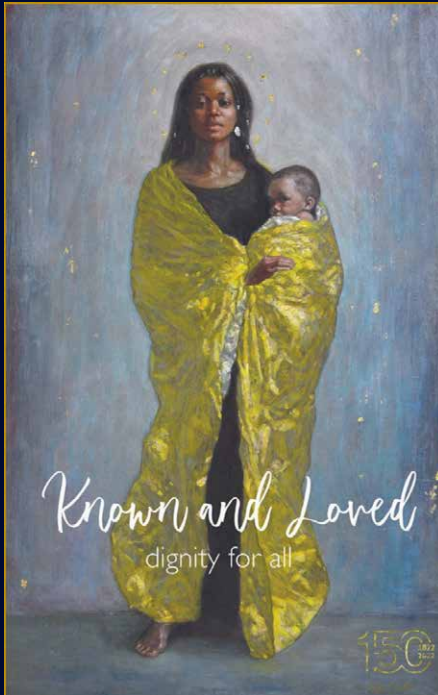
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Principal's Report



Reflection on the Feast of St Marcellin Champagnat

The relationship of Marcellin to Mary was deeply marked by an affective and total trust in her, as the “Good Mother,” because it was her work that he undertook.

He wrote once: *Without Mary we are nothing and with Mary we have everything, because Mary always has her adorable Son within her arms or in her heart.* This belief remained constant all through his life. Jesus and Mary were the treasure on which Marcellin had learned to place his own heart.

This intimate relationship helped shape the Marial dimension of our spirituality. In our tradition, the phrase “**Ordinary Resource**” has come to encapsulate our constant reliance of Mary. The motto attributed to Champagnat by his biographer, **All to Jesus through Mary, all to Mary for Jesus**, captures this close relationship between the Son and the Mother and our Founder’s attitude of confidence in Mary, which we are invited to live (Water from the Rock, 25)

While books have been written about Marcellin, we need to look no further than our own Charism Garden to find some beautiful guides to everyday life with Christ.

This is an exciting time in the evolution of the College and reinforces once again the commitment of the Bishop of Sale and the Marist Provincial to Catholic Education in Sale and the Learning and Wellbeing in faith of our young people. The new College Board will assume its duties on the 1st July 2022.

Principal's Report

Recently we were privileged to be visited by Sr Mary Reburn NDS (Sister of Our Lady of Zion). Sr Mary spoke to all College staff about the origins of our Sion Heritage and the ongoing work to develop relationships between the Christian and Jewish traditions. In particular, Sr Mary engaged us with the story of the seven Sisters of Our Lady of Zion who were awarded the 'Righteous Amongst the Nations' medal by the Government of Israel for their work in saving Jewish people from the Nazi regime and the horrific Holocaust. Sr Mary made us feel "so humble" in the face of their courage, "so proud" that we as a Sion heritage school are part of this story and "so empowered" to see what we can do to challenge cruel wrongs and support the vulnerable in our society.

The College has been represented at the recent 150th year Marist Celebrations in Sydney and the Annual DOSCEL Leadership Eucharist & Dinner to celebrate Catholic Education Week.

May I take this opportunity to acknowledge the generosity of so many staff that have made a number of recent student activities and adventures possible. Especially the Year 7 Camp, the Year 10 Camp to Ballarat, the Year 12 Retreat and numerous P.E. overnight camps. This extra commitment makes these activities possible for our students.

Learning and Wellbeing

This term has been significant for many students and their families as we are faced with the onset of winter and significant absences as we continue to live with Covid 19. Uniform Expectations

The good standing of the College is significantly influenced by the way students wear the uniform and present themselves.

Students are expected to wear the College Blazer while travelling to and from school each day during Terms 2 and 3. As well, students are to give attention to cleanliness, grooming and neatness.

Parents/carers must give full support to the College in ensuring that the uniform requirements (as outlined in the Student Diary) and personal presentation of the students are in full accord with the College's uniform regulations. Monitoring the correct wearing of the uniform is the joint responsibility of the student, the

students parent(s)/carers and members of staff. Any incorrect item of clothing is deemed to be out of uniform.

The Pastoral teacher is responsible for checking uniforms at the start of the day and noting offences. Teachers are expected to monitor uniform in all classes and to ensure that students enter and leave classes appropriately dressed.

Marcellin Champagnat

Our school is based around two “charisms” or visions of Catholic education: one from the Sion Sisters who founded Sion in 1893 and one from the Marist Brothers who started St Pat’s in 1922. The Marist Brothers take their vision from St Marcellin Champagnat, whose feast day is celebrated by the school at this time of year. Marcellin is often looked to as a great inspiration for teachers as his main aim was to found new schools at a time when state authorities were banning any form of religious education in France. His spirit inspired others to move around the world and start schools for students which allowed those students to learn in an environment of care and support. We carry that tradition on at Catholic College Sale. Our celebration of the feast day of St Marcellin was held on Tuesday June 21.



A huge thank you to everyone who contributed to fundraising for Project Compassion in term 1. A special thank you to the RESA students in years 10 and 11 who put in a lot of work with BBQ’s at both Swimming Carnivals and an all School Fundraiser on St Patrick’s Day.

On St Patrick’s Day, the Year 11 RESA class had the privilege of raising money for Caritas Australia and putting on some great St Patrick’s Day celebrations for the whole school, with the guidance of our very own Irish patriot Mrs Jo Clancy. Students were able to wear their casual clothes for a gold coin donation and enjoy lunch, hosted by our class. Students had the opportunity to buy sausages and drinks, including green spiders and a range of other soft drinks. A big thank you to Centre Bakery for providing the bread for our sausage sizzle

free of charge, helping us raise \$1,800. Thank you and congratulations to all staff and students involved in putting on a very successful day.

All together throughout term 1 the school raised just over \$3,600 which could provide:

Our **Year 10s** have recently completed the unit on “The World of Work” in their career classes. This included looking at employability skills and gaining their Safe@work certificates. We would like to encourage students to be proactive and organise their work experience for next term. This is a great opportunity to challenge themselves and explore their interests while gaining new skills and knowledge in the workplace. In class, we will be developing resumes, learning how to write effective cover letters and learning about how to achieve success in interviews.

During the Year 10s recent trip to Ballarat we visited 3 different universities: Monash Melbourne, Federation and ACU Ballarat. This gave students a snap shot of what attending university would entail. Our next term careers lessons will include researching university courses in order to determine prerequisite subjects and ATARs required for their potential career path.



The **Year 12s** recently attended the TIS (Tertiary Information Session) event where they had the opportunity to meet with various university and TAFE representatives. Students were able to gather information to help them explore the various options offered by these institutions. This information will be invaluable to them as they proceed in this next step of planning for their post school choices.

DECEMBER

Get your ATAR at 7am, **12 December** and consider changing your preferences before 4pm, **14 December**. December course offers are released on **21 December**. If you want, you can change your preferences after that in time for January offers.

Kayla finished 1st with a time of 1:00.80, just 17 hundredths of a second ahead of her nearest opponent! Kayla also finished 3rd in the 15 Years Girls 50m Freestyle with a time of 29.24 seconds.

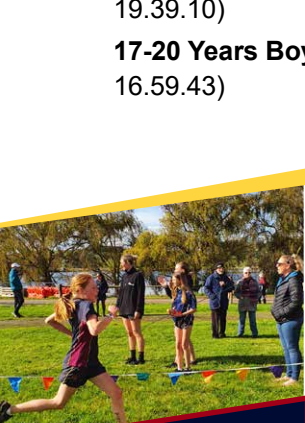

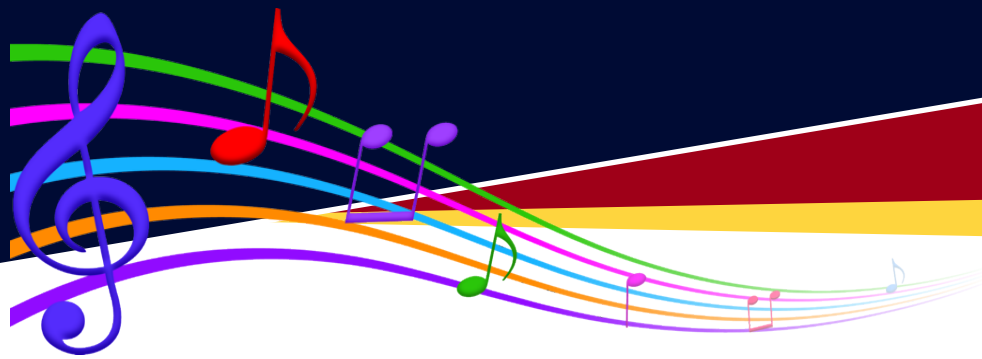

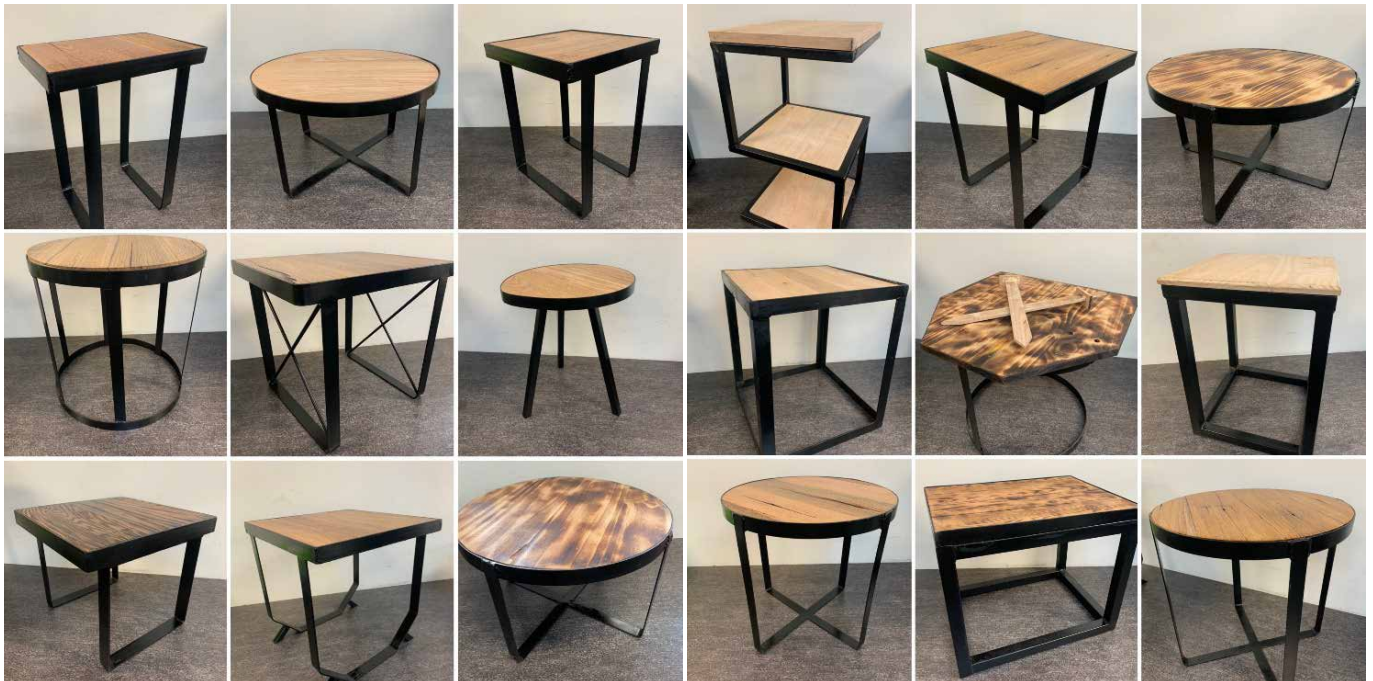


Technology

After researching existing table designs, creating their own idea and sketching a detail drawing of their final concept, students then moved into

the workshop to produce their tables. In the workshop they were exposed to many different fabrication processes such as welding, angle grinding, timber joining and laminating. 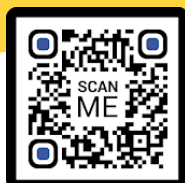
